

SUNSMART

Get your wide brimmed hats ready!

Sunsmart time is here and there are 5 things to remember...

UV levels in Victoria are on the rise again so it is time to grab your sun protection gear and do the SunSmart Countdown. Whenever UV levels reach 3 and above, sun protection is needed



because that is when the sun can start to damage skin and eyes and lead to skin cancer. Use a combination of the following five sun protection measures:

- 1. Slip on clothing that covers as much skin as possible (no singlet tops).
- 2. Slop on SPF30+ broad spectrum sunscreen (remember to reapply it be fore going outside).
- 3. Slap on a wide brimmed hat that shades the head, face, neck and ears.
- 4. Seek shade.
- 5. Slide on some wraparound sunglasses

During the Sunsmart period students not wearing a wide brimmed school hat will be directed to sit in a shaded area. We appreciate your support with encouraging SunsSmart behaviours. In anticipation of a return to onsite schooling at some stage during term 4 please remember school hats can be purchased through PSW, very limited stock held at the school office.

STUDENT SCHOLARSHIPS

Year 4-12 student scholarships

The Department of Education and Training manages a number of scholarships which are available to students who are currently enrolled in Years 4-12.

Applicants for these scholarships are evaluated on their:

- * participation in school activities
- * community involvement
- * academic record for the current year.

Scholarships are either one-off payments or for the duration of the student's course/study annually.

Applications for these scholarships, number of which have specific eligibility criteria, will open on 1 October 2021 and close on 28 February 2022.

HUME CITY COUNCIL Living with wildlife MAGPIES

The Australian Magpie has one of the widest distributions within Australia of any bird, being only absent from the northern tip of Cape York Peninsula and the driest deserts of Western Australia. Magpies can be found in almost all areas where there are trees and open areas for foraging. There is only one species of Magpie, but this has three subspecies which vary slightly.

There has been an increase in Magpie numbers since European settlement, largely due to the conversion of forests and woodlands to agriculture and grazing land. Urban areas with their parks, fertilised lawns and trees also support high densities of Magpies.

Diet

Magpies feed on insects and seeds. Many of the insects they eat are dug from the top few centimetres of soil.

Problems

During breeding season (Spring and early Summer), Magpies often view people, other animals, or vehicles as a potential threat to their young, which sometimes triggers swooping. If contact is made this can cause injury. Research has shown that only a small percentage of Magpies will actually swoop (approximately 5%) and a smaller percentage again will make contact.

A majority of magpies that swoop target specific groups like cyclists or pedestrians. Others target certain individuals and ignore others.

Internet Safety Tips for Parents, Teachers & Carers

- The use of computers, laptops or any internet enabled devices (iPad, phone, iPod, Xbox) SHOULD be in a common area of the house NOT IN THE BEDROOM! Need an alarm buy a clock radio!
- Parental monitoring is vital walk past and see what your child is doing, who they are talking to and what sites they are on....be aware if their mood changes. This is NOT invading their privacy at all...it is parenting in the digital space.
- Make sure there is no response to rude or harassing emails. (keep a record in case of further investigation)
- Advise your student/child to immediately exit any site that makes them feel uncomfortable or worried. Basic protective behaviour principles apply.
- If the harassment continues....the current email account can be deleted and a new one started. The new email address should only be given to a selected few.
- If receiving harassing messages on social media have the sender blocked & report to the site.
- If you have found inappropriate content about your child or one in your care on a website or are informed about this situation please contact the ISP and or Police or advise the parent to do so ASAP.
- Have a family internet contract and set house rules about what information your child can put onto websites or share with others.
- Be aware the majority of children WILL NOT tell a parent/teacher if bullied or harassed online for fear that they will lose internet access!!
- Make sure that your children understand that they will not get in trouble if they tell you about a problem.
- Parents must learn about the internet with their child get students to share their knowledge of the internet with their parents in a fun environment
